### TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION IN KIRKLAND LAKE

### National Day for Truth and Reconciliation - Monday, September 30, 2024

September 30th is National Truth and Reconciliation Day. On this day, we acknowledge the history of residential schools in Canada and honour the Survivors, their families, and the communities that experience ongoing intergenerational trauma. Understanding this shared history helps ensure that we reflect on the legacy of the residential schools in order to move towards a more inclusive Nation.

In Kirkland Lake, the Mayor has Proclaimed September 30th as the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation also known as "Orange Shirt Day".

For pause and reflection in the community on National Day of Truth and Reconciliation, the Town will be lighting up the "Gateway" signs at each end of Town, and Miners' Memorial in orange.





The Survivors' Flag will be raised at the Municipal Office commencing on Friday, September 27, 2027 through to Tuesday, October 1, 2024.

#### Creation and Meaning of The Survivors Flag

The orange and white Survivors' Flag was designed by the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation (NCTR) in consultation with Survivors from across Canada as an expression of remembrance. The Flag was developed through consultation and collaboration with Inuit, Mi'kmaq, Atikamekw, Cree, Ojibway, Dakota, Mohawk, Dene, Nuu-chah-nulth, Secwepemc, and Métis.

The Flag features <u>nine distinct elements</u>, each with special meaning. For example, the seeds depicted underneath the family and children represent the spirits of the children who never returned home.

National Day for Truth and Reconciliation The Survivor's Flag



Hosted by the University of Manitoba, the NCTR was created to preserve the memory of Canada's residential school system and legacy. They are stewards and share the truths of Survivors' experiences in a respectful way. They work with Indigenous and non-Indigenous educators, researchers, communities, decision-makers, and public to support works of truth, reconciliation, and healing Nation-wide.

The Survivors' Flag was first raised at Town Hall in 2022 to mark the inaugural National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.

#### The Importance of the Land Acknowledgement Statement

The Town respectfully acknowledges that it operates on land within the Robinson-Huron Treaty and unceded Indigenous territory, specifically within the traditional territories of Beaverhouse First Nation.

Acknowledging territory is the process of deliberately bringing awareness that Kirkland Lakers inhabit Indigenous land and water, and that specific Indigenous Peoples have inherent territorial rights in the community we know and love.

Establishing a statement provides an opportunity for Town

to pause and generate an opportunity for reflection of the local government's assurances of building better relationships with local Indigenous Peoples; creating a more just society.

The practice of acknowledgment was adopted by Town Council to contribute to addressing settler colonialism and give pause to everyone's relationship with the land. During Meetings of Council, the following Land Acknowledgement Statement is made prior to the business being conducted:



"We acknowledge that the Town of Kirkland Lake is located on the traditional territory of Algonquin peoples including Beaverhouse First Nation, and unceded territory of other Indigenous peoples. We recognize the presence of the Algonquin, Anishanabai, Ojibwe, Cree and Métis people in our community since time immemorial and honour their stewardship and care of these lands. We hereby affirm our continued commitment and responsibility to reconciliation."

You may have noticed, many if not all Town-owned facilities feature a plaque in reception areas to bring public and staff awareness of the Indigenous territory inhabited.

#### How to Individually Engage in Truth and Reconciliation


Here are some suggestions on how each of us can engage in Truth and Reconciliation:

- Educate yourself surrounding Indigenous History and the Residential School System. Either virtually through <u>NCTR</u> <u>Webinars</u> or by heading to our local library to learn more. There are a number of other Resources available to you online such as: <u>Residential School History</u>, <u>Indigenous</u> <u>Perspectives Education Guide</u>, <u>The Residential School</u> <u>System</u>, <u>Canada's Commitment to Reconciliation</u>, etc.
- Familiarize yourself with the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's <u>94 Calls to Action</u>. A <u>child-friendly version</u> of the Calls to Action was created by the <u>First Nations Child</u> <u>and Family Caring Society</u> if you wish to pass the education onto your young.

- 3. Acknowledge the land you live on. Whose Land is an "App" that identifies Indigenous Nations, territories and communities to help you know where you live, work, and play. The Federal Government's GeoViewer identifies the First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples who live near you.
- 4. Listening and Learning. There is no better time to listen and learn from the Indigenous peoples in the community. Talking to Elders, attending Ceremonial events, Powwows, workshops, community groups. Listening to Indigenous persons you are acquainted with about their lived experiences will enrich your perspective. There are all kinds of television programs, podcasts, books/audiobooks and radio programs designed by, or dedicated to, Indigenous peoples and creators that are available at our fingertips.
- 5. Support Indigenous creators and businesses & non-profit organizations. Your consumerism, shares and likes of Indigenous products and services help support the local economy and assist Indigenous content creators and business awareness on social mediums. Discussing and sharing your supporting for local non-profits (i.e. <a href="Keepers of The Circle">Keepers of The Circle</a>) brings awareness on the equality and wellness for all local Indigenous families within the community.

The Public Works Department is dedicated to improving our storm sewer system by enhancing its water-carrying capacity. This means crews are actively removing sand buildup and debris from catch basins, aging pipes, and ditches.

Here's what we're doing:

- Clearing sediment and debris from open ditches and pipes
- Creating new access points to thoroughly clear blockages and sediment
- Replacing collapsed pipe sections as they find them
- Restoring road sections that have been opened for access

This work remains a priority, so you'll see our Vacuum Trucks and Public Works crews working on improving these systems.
